# About **Share the Care**

“Share the Care” began 17 years ago, and was initially **developed by the Ho-Chunk Nation** with support from the **Spirit of EAGLES Program, UW Carbone Cancer Center**. The success and interest generated by the first conference led Ho-Chunk and SOE to reach out to other interested tribes, Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council, and both public and non-profit cancer-related organizations as sponsors for the conference. This coalition continues to serve as the statewide planning committee for Share the Care, and annually organizes the conference in collaboration with a local tribal/community host.

The conference goal then and now is to help reduce the high cancer burden among WI American Indians by increasing cancer awareness and knowledge, promoting screening and supporting survivors and caregivers.

The day-and-a-half conference is offered free of charge with a varying attendance of 150-285 (depending on location) tribal members, elders, survivors, and health staff from throughout Wisconsin and beyond. Statewide planning committee members serve as co-sponsors, along with the host community, and provide funds, in-kind support, and technical assistance to support the local host.
