#### CANCER AWARENESS April is Alcohol Awareness Month

April has been designated Alcohol Awareness Month. More than 178,000 people die from excess alcohol use in the United States each year.

# Survivorship Resource from National Behavioral Health Network

The National Behavioral Health Network has released a new resource: *Survivor and Thriver Resources for Individuals Affected by Cancer*. #### **Cancer Awareness Week Toolkit**

National Minority Health Month is observed annually in April. During National Minority Health Month, National Minority Cancer Awareness Week provides a more specific opportunity to raise awareness about cancer-related health disparities. The GW Cancer Center's cancer awareness toolkit is designed to help cancer control organizations implement evidence-based practices when communicating about National Minority Health Month, Minority Cancer Awareness Week and cancer prevention among marginalized communities.

#### STUDY Colorectal Cancer Among the Hmong Population in the United States

A recent study published in *Cancer Medicine* analyzed cases of colorectal cancer from the National Cancer Database among Hmong individuals and Non-Hispanic White individuals. The study found that Hmong individuals are on average nearly a decade younger at the time of diagnosis compared to Non-Hispanic White individuals (58.9 compared to 68.7 years respectively). However, the study didn't find a difference in overall survival for those with Hmong ethnicity when compared to the Non-Hispanic White population.

#### RESOURCE Colorectal Cancer Screening Among Adults with Chronic Medical Conditions

BRFSS is a national telephone survey that asks people about their health-related behaviors and risk behaviors, including colorectal cancer screening history. Cross-sectional data from 2012-2020 BRFSS was examined and found being up to date with colorectal cancer screening increased with the number of chronic conditions, but disparities existed among ethnic and racial groups. Hispanic respondents with limited English proficiency had lower screening rates than non-Hispanic White respondents, and Hispanic respondents without limited English proficiency were less likely than non-Hispanic White respondents to be up to date with colorectal cancer screening, regardless of the number of chronic conditions. There were no significant differences between non-Hispanic Black and non-Hispanic White respondents.

#### CONTINUING EDUCATION Continuing Education Course on Anogenital Tract Cancer

The CDC and American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) created a free continuing medical education course for health care providers on lower anogenital tract cancer (vulvar, vaginal and anal cancers). This course discusses warning signs and effective methods to prevent or find these cancers early, including the link to HPV.

The American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO) published a new guideline recommending several vaccinations for adults with cancer, due to their increased risk from several vaccine-preventable diseases. The guidance covers details on what vaccines to give and to whom, timing of vaccination, and which ones to avoid due to potential risks. It also emphasizes that vaccination of household members will enhance protection for patients with cancer.
