Congratulations to Wisconsin "BigShot" Award Recipients

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services Division of Public Health announced their 2024 "BigShot" Award recipients. The winning recipients are health care providers in the Vaccines for Children Program who, according to data from the Wisconsin Immunization Registry, have achieved significant vaccine coverage among their patient populations.

Two vaccines help prevent cancer (HPV and hepatitis B). Among two categories of awardees, 14 providers have ensured that 90 percent of their patients are up to date on their routine series of vaccination by age 2 (which includes hepatitis B), and one provider has ensured that 80 percent of their adolescent patients are up to date on Tdap, meningococcal, and HPV vaccines.

NEW DATA

Latest Cancer Incidence Data from the Wisconsin Cancer Reporting System

Data from diagnosis year 2021 have been posted to the WISH (Wisconsin Interactive Statistics on Health) cancer incidence modules. These modules provide free, public access to incident cancer case counts and rates based on information reported to the Wisconsin Cancer Reporting System (WCRS).

WCRS collects cancer incidence data from hospitals, physicians, and clinical reports on Wisconsin residents as mandated by state law. All tumors with malignant cell types are reportable except basal cell and squamous cell carcinomas of the skin and *in situ* cervical cancer.

Helping to Diversify Clinical Trials

The University of Wisconsin-Madison is seeking participants for a research project focusing on clinical trials education. The project is open to anyone in the state of Wisconsin age 18 and older and takes about 15 minutes to complete.

The study centers on education/awareness on clinical trials. It can be completed via video, phone, or in person, and consists of three parts: a five to 10 minute questionnaire about clinical trials,10 to15 minutes of education on clinical trials (video, phone, or in person) and a five to 10 minute questionnaire after the education presentation Upon completion participants will receive a \$25 gift card to Amazon or Walmart.

The Wisconsin Collaborative for Healthcare Quality (WCHQ) created a childhood and adolescent immunization toolkit to help empower and equip healthcare professionals with the necessary information on immunization recommendations, guidelines, and resources.

The goal is to empower the care team to engage effectively in patient conversations, promoting informed decision-making and fostering a collaborative approach to ensuring optimal childhood and adolescent immunization coverage (including HPV and hepatitis B vaccines, which are important cancer prevention tools).

New Sun Safety Tips Resources

The CDC's Division of Cancer Prevention and Control (DCPC) shares several ways to protect your skin from too much exposure to the sun and reminds us that sun safety is for everybody. So, how do you protect your skin?

- Stay in the shade as much as possible.
- When you can, wear clothing that covers your arms and leas.
- Wear a hat with a wide brim to shade your face, head, ears, and neck.
- Wear sunglasses that wrap around and block both UVA and UVB rays.
- Use a broad-spectrum sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of 15 or higher.

New ACS Report on Cancer Facts for Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Other Pacific Islander People

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The American Cancer Society recently released a report providing an overview of cancer facts and figures for disaggregated Asian American and Pacific Islander ethnic groups in the United States. Key findings include:

- Cancer is the leading cause of death in Chinese, Filipino, Korean, and Vietnamese people.
- Native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander people are 75% more likely to die from liver cancer and 2 to 3 times more likely to die from cervical, stomach and endometrial cancers compared to White people.

It's important to acknowledge the diversity of Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Other Island Pacific Islander populations and how cancer impacts them. Opportunities exist to better increase cancer prevention and screening in culturally and linguistically appropriate ways.

Nearly Half of Cancer Patients Have Medical Debt

The American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN) has released its latest **Survivor Views** survey. The survey, which surveyed participants nationwide who have been diagnosed with or treated for cancer in the last seven years, shows nearly half of cancer patients and survivors have medical debt related to their cancer.

Cervical Cancer Rates Rising in Low-Income U.S. Counties

A recent study published in the *International Journal of Cancer* found that the incidence and mortality rates of cervical cancer are rising for women living in the lowest-income counties in the United States. This is especially concerning as cervical cancer is largely preventable due to HPV vaccination and can be screened and detected early through

Analysis of State-Level Early Onset Cancer Incidence

<u>Study</u>

This study from the CDC provides the first analysis of age-adjusted rates of early-onset cancer (ages 20-40 years from 2016-2020) based on state-level population and case counts. Nationwide, early-onset cancer accounted for 11.4% of all cancer cases - including 17.3% of female breast cancers and 8.8% of digestive cancers. Incidence varies by state. States that have worse than national rates are often located near each other.

Wisconsin is one of the three states where early-onset breast cancer is rising. Wisconsin also has high overall incidence for male genital cancer and high overall and advanced-stage incidence for skin cancer and

breast cancer compared to the nation overall. The causes are unknown. Future analysis should consider county level or zip code data when possible.

Rural vs. Urban Disparities

Read the Study

A recent CDC report looking at data from 2010-2022, found that preventable early deaths from the five leading causes (heart disease, cancer, unintentional injury, chronic lower respiratory disease, and stroke) are more common among people living in rural areas compared to urban areas.

Helpful areas of cancer control include: helping people quit smoking, increasing cancer prevention and early detection, and encouraging physical activity and healthy eating.
