HOW MUCH IS TOO MUCH?

It's recommended that women have no more than one drink per day, and men have no more than two drinks per day.

One drink =



12 ounces of beer (5% alcohol)



5 ounces of wine (12% alcohol)



1.5 ounces of hard liquor (40% alcohol)
