Prevent Cervical Cancer

Cervical cancer can be **cured** when found early!

Who needs to be tested?

Women ages 21-65

There are free and low-cost test options.



What type of test and how often?

You can get tested for cervical cancer at your yearly check-up or at an OB-GYN visit. There are 2 kinds of tests:

1. Pap test

This test looks for pre-cancer cells in the cervix.

2. HPV test


This test looks for a virus called HPV (human papillomavirus) The HPV virus can lead to cervical cancer.

Age	Type of test	How often
21-29	Pap test	Every 3 years
30-65	Pap test or Pap + HPV test	Every 3 years Every 5 years
65+	Don't need to be tested if:Had regular tests for last 10 yearsNo serious pre-cancer found in last 20 years	

1 You may need to be tested more often if you:

- · Had an abnormal Pap in the past.
- Have a weak immune system. For example: HIV infection, organ transplant or long-term steroid use.
- Your mother used DES estrogen treatment to prevent miscarriage, and you were born between 1940-1971.

Paying for the test:

Health insurance

Cervical cancer tests are free with health insurance

Family planning program

Pays for cervical cancer tests if you:

- Are a U.S. citizen, refugee, asylee or other legal immigrant who has lived in the U.S. for 5 years or more (if over age 18)
- ☐ The person applying has a monthly income between \$0 \$3,840

Wisconsin Well Woman Program

Pays for cervical cancer tests if you:

- ☐ Are between ages 40-64
- ☐ Don't have health insurance, or need help paying for a cervical cancer exam
- ☐ Your income is at or below 250% of the federal poverty level. Check if your income qualifies by scanning the QR code.

Can give you a cervical cancer test at a discount based on your income and family size.


To apply for a program

2-1-1 is a United Way Helpline that connects people to local help in the community.



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How can I prevent cervical cancer?

Get HPV shots (Human papillomavirus)

The HPV shot gives the best protection to boys and girls at age 11 or 12. If you didn't get the vaccine as a pre-teen, it is recommended up to age 26.

This shot is free with most health insurance. If you don't have health insurance, you may be able to get the shot for free from your local public health department.
