New Breast Cancer Statistics from the American Cancer Society

The American Cancer Society (ACS) recently released two new documents providing an update on breast cancer trends in the United States.

In good news, breast cancer mortality rates have dropped 44% since 1989, preventing approximately 517,900 breast cancer deaths. However, not all women have benefitted from this progress. Breast cancer mortality rates have remained unchanged for the past three decades for American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) women. Another finding of concern is the upward trend in breast cancer incidence, rising by 1% annually during 2012-2021, with the steepest increase in women younger than 50 years and Asian American/Pacific Islander (AAPI) women of any age.

Other key findings from the report include:

- AIAN women have 10% lower breast cancer incidence than White women, but 6% higher mortality, and only 51% of AIAN women 40 years or older had a mammogram in the past two years compared to 68% of White women.
- Breast cancer in women under 50 years has increased in AAPI women by 50% since 2000, surpassing the rate in young Hispanic, AIAN, and Black women to become the highest rate alongside White women (both 86 per 100,000).
- Black women continue to have a 38% higher breast cancer mortality rate than White women, despite a 5% lower incidence. Black women also have lower survival than White women for every breast cancer subtype and stage of diagnosis except localized disease, with which they are 10% less likely to be diagnosed (58% versus 68%).

A vote on the findings is not scheduled. The vaccine recommendation will not be changing at this meeting; the committee will be discussing whether the recommendation may change in the future. Multiple Myeloma Symposium Set for October

Multiple myeloma is a complex and aggressive form of cancer that disproportionately impacts certain racial and ethnic groups, particularly African Americans. The symposium is dedicated to understanding disparities, identifying actionable solutions, and fostering collaborations that ensure equal access to care for all patients, regardless of race, socioeconomic status, or geographic location.

The symposium will be held in Milwaukee on October 26, from 9:30 a.m. to11:00 a.m. It is presented by the Medical College of Wisconsin Cancer Center Community Outreach and Engagement, UW Madison Carbone Cancer Center, and the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society.

Plan Now for National Lung Cancer Screening Day

National Lung Cancer Screening Day will be observed on Saturday, Nov. 9. Providers can participate by opening their facility for screening. The American Cancer Society National Lung Cancer Roundtable, ACR®, Radiology Health Equity Coalition and Go2 for Lung Cancer have partnered again for this annual event to increase screening access for people who cannot take time off during the week to get screened.

Lung cancer is one of the deadliest forms of cancer, and it is estimated it will claim the lives of more than 125,00 Americans this year. Survival rates can be improved significantly by screening, yet only a small percentage of eligible individuals get screened for lung cancer.

Sign up to have your facility participate, then share the message with your network to get more people screened, help reduce disparities and create more lung cancer survivors.

Cervical Cancer Data Dashboard

The American Cancer Society National Roundtable on Cervical Cancer created a new Cancer Data Dashboard that offers interactive data pertaining to cervical cancer in the United States. These maps can be used by researchers, public health professionals, policymakers, and others to understand and illustrate the burden of cervical cancer in communities across the United States and assist in planning and tailoring interventions.

Rural Mammography

A recent study in the Wisconsin Medical Journal, interviewed hospital staff and community members in Columbia County Wisconsin to identify facilitators and barriers to mammogram screening. Clinician recommendation was a primary facilitator and insurance concerns were the primary barrier. Top reasons for having their first mammogram were doctor recommendation (70%), family history (19%), and personal decision (18%). Top reasons they did not have a mammogram screening at least every year were putting it off (23%), lack of problems (17%), and pandemic-related reasons (15%).

Cancer Incidence Trends in 2021

During the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, US cancer diagnoses were substantially lower than expected. This recent study found that rates of diagnosis improved in 2021 compared to 2020, but continued to be lower than expected. It is vital that cancer screenings be prioritized to catch up to expected rates.

Impact of Immunizations

A new CDC report quantified health benefits and economic impact of immunizations given between 1994-2023. Among ~117 million children, routine childhood vaccinations will have prevented approximately 508 million lifetime cases of illness, 32 million hospitalizations, and 1,129,000 deaths, at a net savings of \$540 billion in direct costs and \$2.7 trillion in societal costs.

The report did not include subsequent cancers averted, which also have significant costs to societies and payers. Childhood vaccinations provide substantial health and economic benefits for payers and individuals and are an important equity tool. The Vaccines for Children (VFC) program has covered the cost of eligible children in the United States since 1994 and remains an important access point for childhood immunizations.
