Summit Preparations in Full Swing

The Wisconsin Cancer Summit will be held Thursday, September 25 at the Glacier Canyon Conference Center at the Wilderness Resort in Wisconsin Dells.

We will celebrate 20 years of cancer control and prevention work in Wisconsin with our member organizations. As always, the Summit is free, and we encourage our members to attend.

Registration is open and we are also seeking award nominations for people and organizations whose work inspires you. The awards ceremony will take place at the Summit.



- The Champion Award honors an individual who has made a significant contribution to cancer control outcomes - locally, regionally and/or statewide.
- The Collaboration Award honors a group of two or more organizations that have demonstrated effective teamwork in advancing cancer control goals.
- The Health Care Hero Award honors an individual health care worker, or a system/clinic/practice, for their exceptional dedication to serving and supporting patients while advancing the progress of public health.
- The Impact Award honors an organization or project that has made a significant contribution to cancer control outcomes – locally, regionally, and/or statewide.
- The Policy Change Maker Award which recognizes an individual who has made a significant and lasting impact on cancer prevention and control policy in Wisconsin.

Exhibiting at the Wisconsin Cancer Summit gives you the opportunity to showcase your organization and network with its attendees.

- For-profit organizations may exhibit for a \$750 fee.
- Non-profit organizations may exhibit at no cost.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Ashley Smith, Rural Outreach Specialist

Ashley Smith, RN works as the University of Wisconsin Carbone Cancer Center's Rural Outreach Specialist. She is part of the Cancer Health Disparities Initiative (CHDI) team working on reducing barriers to rural cancer care. Through community education on cancer screening and prevention, the hope is to improve cancer screening and early detection rates in northern Wisconsin.



"I live and work in northern Wisconsin but collaborate with tribes and rural communities all over the state," Ashley said. An example of her work is an initiative with the Bad River Tribe in Northern Wisconsin, where they have been working together for a year and a half.

"The UW Carbone Cancer Center (UWCCC) gave the Bad River Tribe a cancer screening and prevention grant to focus on breast and CRC cancers," she said. "I partnered with Nona Crowe, the Well Woman Program (WWP) Tribal Liaison and Benefits Specialist, to create culturally tailored activities that focus on cancer screening and prevention efforts. With Carol Cameron's permission, we shared the Pink Shawls Initiative monthly meeting and create shawls to build awareness around the various cancers affecting the native community. Each month would feature a meal, storytelling, and education on various cancer-related topics."

"Our goal is to increase breast and colorectal cancer screening," Smith said. "We did this through a variety of methods. We also have a grant with Bad River focusing on radon mitigation and lung cancer awareness. We try to do at least one event per month focused on these topics and the work is ongoing. In the future, we hope to do another round of radon testing and mitigation in fall and winter."

"It is a unique partnership," she said. "It helps that I live and work in this community so I have been able to build trust and share resources that may not otherwise have been available while addressing the cancer burden that rural and tribal communities face. I have collaborated with other tribes as well, including Menominee and Stockbridge, and hope to be able to continue to grow this work. I hope to partner with other tribes and organizations moving forward!"

Project Connect is a free lifestyle program designed by Tricia's Troops Cancer Connection to help local cancer survivors optimize their health, healing and wellbeing. Survivor Support with a Mentor Model

There are a couple of organizations that specialize in offering support to cancer survivors through a mentor-based model.

- Imerman Angels is a nonprofit organization that provides free, one-on-one support to cancer fighters, survivors, previvors, and caregivers. Through a personalized matching process, individuals are connected with trained volunteers, called Mentor Angels who have experienced a similar cancer journey. Matches are based on factors like diagnosis, age, gender, and treatment type, offering emotional support and understanding from someone who truly "gets it." Services are completely free and available nationwide.
- ABCD: After Breast Cancer Diagnosis is the recognized "gold standard" in providing personalized, free, one-to-one support for all those affected by breast cancer—patients, families and friends. Trained and professionally supported volunteer survivors and cosurvivors help those dealing with breast cancer, from the newly diagnosed to those in treatment and beyond. Through their signature service of one-to-one mentoring, ABCD Mentor Matches are created based on similar diagnoses, treatment plans and life circumstances.

New Community Advisory Board Recruiting Healthcare Professionals

A new Community Advisory Board (CAB) will help create a job support program for cancer survivors to help them work through and after treatment.

There will be four 90-minute virtual CAB meetings between September 2025 and April 2026. Members will share their professional experiences and insights from supporting cancer survivors in their employment during and after treatment and provide feedback on a job support program.

Eligible participants must be a healthcare professional who works primarily with cancer patients/survivors and be able to commit to attending four virtual meetings and a final joint meeting with the cancer survivor CAB in person in Madison at the end of the year.

2025 Annual USCS Release: More Cancer Data for You to Explore

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has released the latest **United States Cancer Statistics** (USCS), with new cancer diagnoses through 2022 and cancer deaths through 2023.

The USCS provides information about cancers diagnosed from 1999 to 2022, and cancer deaths from 1999 to 2023. It combines cancer registry data from CDC's National Program of Cancer Registries (NPCR) and the National Cancer Institute's Surveillance, Epidemiology, and End Results (SEER) Program.

This USCS data release covers new cancers and deaths reported in all 50 states and the District of Columbia.
