



Cancer Survivorship Resources

The Wisconsin Cancer Collaborative has compiled various survivorship resources aimed at helping health care providers and community partners looking to add or further incorporate cancer survivorship into their work.

Primary Care

General Resources

- <u>ACS Information for Health Professionals</u> Portal made for healthcare professionals to access ACS guidelines and provider and patient education resources, including those related to survivorship care.
- <u>ASCO Guidelines on Survivorship Care</u> Provides clinical guidelines about the long-term screening, surveillance, and symptom management needs of cancer survivors.
- <u>ASCO Provider Advice for Addressing Survivor Tobacco Use</u> Addressing tobacco use in cancer survivors and discussing cessation and effects on health and possible future cancers. Provides links to other smoking cessation resources and further information for health professionals.
- <u>CDC Guides to Healthy Living</u> Three accessible guides for people who had cancer with recommendations related to physical health, emotional health, and sexual health and intimacy.
- <u>CDC Information for Health Care Providers about Cancer Survivors</u> Resources to help doctors provide care for people with cancer, including information about survivorship care plans.
- <u>Children's Oncology Group Resources for Pediatric Providers</u> Selection of resources specifically tuned to issues childhood cancer survivors may need care for.

Cancer Centers Building Survivorship Care

Survivorship Care Plans

- <u>ASCO Survivorship Care Guidelines, Care Plans, & Resources</u> A collection of survivorship guidelines, survivorship care plans, and survivorship resources for clinicians and healthcare professionals.
- ASCO Treatment and Survivorship Care Plans Access to both ASCO survivorship care plans and cancer treatment plans generalizable to all cancers, as well as specific formats for lymphoma and lung, breast, prostate, and colorectal cancers. Treatment plan can be completed by the oncology team, summarizing cancer treatment and follow-up care. Survivorship plan speaks to future checkups and needs of the patient to maintain good health going forward.
- OncoLife Survivorship Care Plan Example of survivorship care plan to be completed by a provider, or by a patient with help from their oncology team. PCPs could then use such a plan to maintain the wishes and practices of the patient and their oncology team.

- MACC Fund A non-profit organization that hosts support groups for childhood cancer survivors and their caregivers and raises awareness for childhood cancer research.
- <u>Milwaukee Consortium for Hmong Health, Inc.</u> Serving the Hmong and Southeast Asian population in Milwaukee by providing cancer prevention resources and screening opportunities and by hosting survivorship support groups.

- <u>No Stomach For Cancer</u> Headquartered in Madison, Wisconsin and serving families around the globe, this organization helps raise awareness, advance stomach cancer education and support individuals and families affected by all forms of stomach cancer.
- Rock County Cancer Coalition Coalition based in Rock County, Wisconsin that provides financial assistance to people in treatment.
- <u>SHE Thrives</u> A nonprofit organization focused on providing tangible essentials to women going through breast cancer treatment.
- <u>Side Effect Support, LLC</u> An organization that provides professional education resources for cancer patients and their oncology team with the goal of improving the oral health and overall wellbeing of those fighting cancer.
- <u>Team Phoenix</u> A 14-week fitness and research program in which cancer survivors regain endurance, strength, flexibility, and overall health and wellness after cancer treatment by training for a sprint-distance triathlon.
- <u>Temple of Kinship</u> A nonprofit organization that offers free-to-attend retreats designed for people navigating Metastatic Breast Cancer (MBC), and one friend.
- <u>Tricia's Troops</u> A nonprofit organization that provides financial assistance, service coordination and supportive care to cancer patients throughout Southeast Wisconsin.
- <u>Wisconsin Inter-Tribal Pink Shawl Initiative</u> A nonprofit organization that educates American Indian women in their communities about the importance of sound breast health through education and advocacy and provides a survivorship community for those directly affected by a breast cancer diagnosis.

National Partners

- <u>After Breast Cancer Diagnosis</u> ABCD provides one-to-one emotional support to anyone impacted by a breast cancer diagnosis. Services are available to anyone in the world.
- <u>American Cancer Society</u> National organization that provides advocacy, research and patient support for people with cancer and their families. This section provides information about health management for cancer survivors.
- <u>American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network</u> National network of volunteers seeking to impact policy change from their elected officials.
- <u>American Childhood Cancer Organization</u> National organization focused on community support, information and advocacy regarding childhood and adolescent cancer.
- <u>American Indian Cancer Foundation</u> National organization that addresses the needs of Native cancer survivors, caregivers, and their families.

- <u>National LGBT Cancer Network</u> A national organization that provides education, training, support, and advocating for LGBT cancer survivors.
- <u>Susan G. Komen</u> National organization that provides a treatment assistance program and information for people diagnosed with breast cancer, including survivorship topics.
- <u>Triage Cancer</u> National organization providing free education on practical and legal issues that arise after a cancer diagnosis.
- Young Survival Coalition Global organization dedicated to young adults diagnosed with breast cancer.
- YMCA Survivor Exercise Program Free or low-cost exercise program for cancer survivors at various YMCAs.
